#### Outcome

Springfield School continues to be a good school.

#### What is it like to attend this school?

Pupils are happy and safe at this school. They behave well in lessons and around the school. Pupils are nearly always kind and respectful towards each other and their teachers. They know that their teachers expect them to try their best, behave well and wear their uniform smartly. Pupils work hard in lessons and persevere with difficult work. Teachers ask them to think hard and answer difficult questions. Pupils achieve well at the school.

From the start of Year 7, pupils are taught about different careers and routes through education. This helps them make the best subject choices. Teachers help pupils become confident young adults who can express ideas and opinions thoughtfully. As a result, pupils are very well prepared for their next steps when they leave.

Pupils say that they would recommend the school to friends and family. Teachers are approachable and make time to help individuals. The rare instances of bullying are dealt with quickly by teachers. Pupils are proud of their school and enjoy the wide range of activities and clubs on offer. One pupil told us, 'This school gives you everything you need to do really well.'

- 'Leaders are determined to provide a highquality education for all pupils, regardless of their ability or circumstances.'
- 'Leaders prioritise pupils' personal development and well-being.'
- 'Pupils study a good range of subjects, which gives them a firm academic grounding. This ambitious curriculum combines with strong careers advice for all pupils.'
- 'Most pupils behave well and at the school and lessons are rarely disrupted ... '
- 'The arrangements for safeguarding are effective. Teachers and Leaders monitor pupils carefully ensuring that they remain safe.'



### Challenge Partners – November 2019

- 'Senior leaders hold a strong and clear vision for inclusive and ambitious education at the school. They provide excellent strategic direction, working closely as a team to provide excellent opportunities for all learners, and promote high aspirations and outcomes.'
- 'The headteacher is clear that the school serves children who live in the community, and that learning should be enjoyable. She has created a positive and inclusive culture and ethos and is selfless in her drive for the success of her pupils.'
- 'There are strong enrichment opportunities, leading to excellent preparation for the next stage of pupils' education. This includes personalised programmes of study, such as construction and hair and beauty. There is also a positive take up of a wide range of extra-curricular activities.'
- 'Teachers show strong subject knowledge, as well as a real love for their subject, and provide additional Period 6 revision for their pupils. Pupils respond well to opportunities to learn independently and are resilient learners.'
- 'The school continues to demonstrate strong GCSE results. School leaders have high ambitions for their pupils. The majority of 2019 students took up the EBacc offer. This is well above the local authority and national figures. In addition, there were 101 grade 9s across all subjects (6% of all grades).'




