## Kathakali

We were very fortunate to have a visit from the world famous Kala Chethena Kathakali company on Thursday 31st March 2022. A group of thirty Year 7 students took part in a workshop led by one of the actors, Vijaya. He introduced to them the language of Kathakali performance which is based on a sign language system that is 4000 years old. They were able to communicate emotions and sentences using specific Kathakali movements, facial expressions and gestures. 7N then had the opportunity to see the make-up being applied and a chance to speak to the performers and the chutti (make-up) artist and ask questions to learn about this art form. They then used pictures of Kathakali theatre to inspire some art work. The day came to a glorious conclusion with a performance by the company, in full costume and make-up, to sixty Year 7 students. It was a truly impressive spectacle; an absolute feast for the senses and an experience that was unique for the majority of the audience. All of Year 7 will be learning about World Theatre in their Drama lessons in the summer term including looking at Kathakali. Year 7 students will be able to bring their new knowledge to these lessons. The company are on tour and I would recommend going to one of their shows so you too can experience the joy that is Kathakali theatre.



Despite the many challenges affecting the school and elsewhere, it's been a very busy and purposeful half term period at Sprinafield. The students have been making the most of every opportunity for learning afforded to them and we have been truly inspired by their fundraising efforts in and out of school for the British Red Cross (Ukraine Appeal). I've heard some heart-warming accounts of family, friends and members of the public supporting our students with their efforts; thank you to everyone in the community who has donated or contributed in some way.

A personal highlight for me this month has undoubtedly been the Kathakali workshop featured on this edition's front cover and I would like to thank Mrs Needham for organising it and the Year 7 participants for sharing with me what they had learned and enjoyed through taking part. Parents may be aware through the media that the Government published its Schools White Paper on 28 March, which focuses on the 'levelling up' agenda and two key ambitions: for 90% of primary children to achieve the expected standard in Key Stage 2 reading, writing and maths by 2030; and for the national average GCSE grade in both English language and

maths to increase to grade 5 by 2030. We are reviewing the full range of proposals and what they mean for schools and trusts with Governors and Trustees; parents and students who would like to know more can find further information via the gov.uk website:

On behalf of the Governors, may I thank those parents who contributed to the school's recent consultation on the cost of school uniform, as featured in the last Springfield News and on the school's website. Broadly speaking, parents were of the school's supportive uniform approach. Some points were made regarding PE kit expectations and as a result of the feedback received, PE socks with a logo will now be optional; appropriate plain black sports socks can be worn instead. There were also some aueries raised reaardina uniform expectations in very hot weather and I would take this opportunity to advise families that in periods of very hot weather (yellow weather warnings) the school has previously taken the approach of relaxing the uniform and/or allowing students to wear their PE kit. This being Britain, such weather is relatively rare! we will advise families However, accordingly as we move through the summer term, as appropriate.

I'd like to thank the staff who are running Easter GCSE revision workshops and encourage Year 11 students to attend as many as they can. We are mindful that our Year 11 students have had an interrupted GCSE programme of study and know the positive difference that a concerted effort and dedicated revision can make in these final few weeks. Keep going Year 11 – we are all supporting you to achieve as well as you can! We hope the practical ideas from the 'Positively You' workshop will help you to remain motivated and revise effectively.

I hope you enjoy reading this edition of Springfield News and wish everyone in our community a safe and happy Easter; we look forward to students returning to enjoy the summer term.

## The Beauty of Nature








## Density Competition



# Remote Parents' Evenings Prove Positive

Earlier this term 89 Year 8 and Year 11 parents kindly responded to a 'Google Forms' style survey regarding the 'Schoolcloud' remote parents evening system.

The vast majority of those responding felt that the system was easy to use and that they were able to make appointments as required. Most respondents also showed that the system made it easy to talk with teachers and that they received useful information about progress and areas for improvement. Some parents felt that the appointment lengths were not long enough for their purposes but the majority still suggested that they would like to have this style of online parents evening in the future.

We have reflected, as a school, on the benefits of this system and have decided to maintain this approach for the foreseeable future. There have been obvious benefits in relation to our Covid-19 risk assessment but we also recognise the ongoing convenience afforded to parents of being able to join the meetings remotely; the lack of waiting time and the ease of booking appointments. Teachers can also provide feedback and host consultations without distraction or the ambient noise of the Sports Hall or a classroom with other appointments going on.

As part of our ongoing development we have recently started using online software in school called 'Classcharts'. This new system will allow staff in school to more effectively and efficiently manage and monitor day to day arrangements such as seating plans (with a range of useful personal data) attendance registers and behaviour management/house points (+/-).




## University of Oxford

Well done to our Year 10 band who performed the songs linked below at the Soundsational concert at Portsmouth Guildhall on 16th March 2022.



## Go-Karting Success

Lucas Hayden's (10L) first taste of motorsport was in 2014 when he got a motocross bike. In 2015 he swapped 2 wheels for 4 when he tried indoor go-karting at Teamsport in Gosport. In 2016 he was lucky enough to get his own go-kart and he swapped indoor karting for outdoor karting, joining Forest Edge Kart Club (based near Barton Stacey, near Andover) and Clay Pigeon Kart Club (near Yeovil). He has spent the last 5 years racing in a local team called ProKart Engineering and competing in the club championships whilst progressing though the ranks of Honda Cadet, Minimax Rotax and Junior Max Rotax (from smaller karts, to full sized adult karts reaching speeds up to 70mph!). Along the way he has gained a few race wins and podiums and finished 4th overall in the Clay Pigeon Minimax Championship. In November 2016 Lucas entered the Ginetta scholarship to try to win a free season in the Ginetta Junior car series, and although he progressed from the first day to the finals he wasn't successful on that occasion. He then heard about the JamSport BRSCC 2022 Fiesta Racing Scholarship, and decided to give that a try. Round 1 was in January, comprising of knowledge, media interviews, SIM racing, and

driving a race car around Blyton Park test Lucas was selected to progress to track. Round 2 in February, at Blyton Park again. The finals, held in mid March at Mallory Park race track near Leicester, were more driving and post-drive analysis focused, with a media task thrown in too. The final assessment looked at the complete package covering all of the elements from the initial rounds and the final, and thankfully JamSport Racing saw the qualities in Lucas that we always knew he has. They made him their 2022 Fiesta Junior Scholarship winner, which gives him a fully paid season in the championship - a prize worth £42,000! Not bad for a lad whose only experience of driving a car was with his dad learning clutch control in B&Q car park so he could pull away without stalling (i.e. no test days in a race car like many of the other Since winning competitors had). scholarship he has had to go back to Mallory Park to take his ARDS test (race licence) to allow him to compete in championship. We are now looking excitedly forward to his first race weekend at Brands Hatch on 9th/10th April.

## 'Art and Me'

'Art and Me' is a new intervention being run in B04 which began at the start of term. The idea behind the intervention is to develop social and emotional skills using art as a vessel and it has been a huge success. 'Art and Me' has mostly been available to Key Stage 3 pupils since February with Year 7 and 8 being the most prominent year groups joining in.

We have been exploring themes of diversity with our Picasso inspired workshop as well as trust exercises with our blind fold drawing game. One particularly successful lesson was sculpting Play-Doh to represent our emotions. Pupils had the challenge to create a model for happiness, sadness and anger and to create something they felt represented that emotion. The idea behind this was for pupils to dive deeply into themselves and explore their emotions on a tangible level and to think about what makes them feel these emotions.

I am very pleased with how much the pupils have enjoyed 'Art and Me' and it has been great seeing pupils develop new social and emotional skills through art.

## Bioplastic Fantastic!

The Year 9 Design and Technology curriculum is currently teaching us all about the different types and qualities of plastics made from non-renewable sources such as oil. These type of plastics can be extremely damaging to the environment as they do not bio-degrade. Following a homework on 'bioplastics', we eagerly asked if that is what we would be making. It turns out we were not making plastic but our eager question did spark an idea in Mr Wilburn's and Mr Stoner's (Design and Technology Technician) heads.

That idea became reality when the Mr Stoner began looking for the recipe and ingredients to make a plastic that would be 100% biodegradable as well as being made from renewable materials. A few lessons went by when Mr Wilburn surprised us with the news that we would be allowed to make our very own bioplastic! This excited us greatly. So during one of our break times we made bioplastic from a very simple recipe. All that it used was vinegar, tapioca starch, water and

vegetable glycerine. After mixing it all together in a saucepan over heat it took on a milky white appearance. After removing it from the heat we waited for it to solidify into a transparent ball that would stick to anything that it touched, it felt gooey and smelled strongly of vinegar. Although none of us tried to eat it, it would have been okay to eat as it was all made from edible materials. We then laid it out on a piece of tinfoil and spread it out the best we could and left it to dry. Meanwhile we tried to create a "W" by using a silicone mould. Even though it did not stick to silicon it was still very difficult to put in the mould so it did not look too much like a "W". It took several days to dry properly. Once dry the sheet had properties similar to Poly Vinyl Chloride (PVC - used in plastic bags). It is an interesting project and we experimenting with it to try and find out if we can make a perfect sheet that we could use on the laser cutter. In conclusion, with a simple recipe we can make a biodegradable and useful plastic.



## **Brilliant Club**

On Friday 25th March, a group of Year 9 pupils attended an online webinar hosted by the University of Nottingham. This event was their introductory session for their place in the Brilliant Club. This is an academic tutorial programme, which will be led by a PhD post graduate tutor.

The webinar informed pupils of the outline of their project, which will involve them attending tutorials to study at an advanced level the area of their PhD tutor's area of research expertise - 'The Age of Modern Disease: Bacterial Biofilms, a chronic Infection and Medical Innovation.' As you might imagine, the level of study is set high to really challenge and develop pupils' thinking, learning and study skills.

Pupils also learnt about University life when

current students described the application process, what it is like to study at university, as well as the wider opportunities such as the clubs and associations and accommodation options. Pupils were looking forward to working with their course tutor and exploring the university style learning in the tutorials.

The pupils have recently had their first tutorial session and we are keen to find out how their work develops. Their tutor, Gareth, who is a microbiologist working medical postdoctoral research fellow in antimicrobial department therapies within the pharmaceutics at the UCL School Pharmacy, was pleased with the interest and enthusiasm shown by the pupils involved.

## Egg Challenge




## Tiny Worlds






## Learning Languages


#### What did you learn?


Wolf Brother by Michelle Paver, 10+


A Good Girl's Guide to Murder by Holly Jackson, 14+


