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### NAPLES TRIP 2019

From 25th to the 28th April, a group of 37 Year 10 pupils travelled to the Bay of Naples to learn about the infamous eruption of Mount Vesuvius that occurred in 79 AD killing more than 16,000 people and the reasons people continue to live there despite the risk of an overdue eruption.

On Thursday 25th April, we arrived at school at an extremely early time of 2.30am to travel to Gatwick Airport and fly to Naples. After a safe flight, we took a coach journey to Sorrento and had fresh Italian pizza for lunch. This was followed by watching a demonstration on making ice cream at a local gelato parlour, eating lots of ice cream and a walk around the streets of Sorrento looking at the markets and the multitude of lemon souvenir shops.

On the second day, we started with a guided tour around the ancient city of Pompeii learning about how the eruption affected the area and what Pompeii was like before the eruption which preserved the Roman city in volcanic ash. It was really interesting to see the remains of Pompeii such as the oldest Roman amphitheatre in the world and the trading market. After this, we trekked up to the top of Mount Vesuvius which was quite tiring in the baking heat but definitely worth it to see the crater of the volcano. While we were at the top, a guide explained the hectic evacuation plan in place for the time when the volcano is going to erupt and high level monitoring of the volcano and which included over 900 seismometers! This was my favourite day as it was fascinating to explore Pompeii and to learn about one of the world's most dangerous volcanoes while standing at the top!

On the last day, we travelled by boat to the Isle of Capri and hopped onto a chairlift to travel the top of the mountain from where we saw amazing views of the island including the Faraglioni rock formations. We then had time to explore the island freely and wander around the central town and shops before the boat journey back to Sorrento. Finally we ended the trip with a greatly enthusiastic karaoke night which was very entertaining! Overall, it was an incredibly enjoyable trip and I can highly recommend it for pupils taking Geography.


House week is also a great chance to earn many more House points by attending every day, working hard and by getting involved in the school community (helping out and participating in extra curricular events).

#### HERTHA AYRTON

Well done to Eleanor Duffy, House Captain of Ayrton, for putting together a hand-written version of the article below. The article gives pupils some interesting information about Hertha Ayrton. This is currently displayed in the Learning Centre on the Ayrton House Board.

Mr Dennett, Head of House Ayrton



Hertha Ayrton was a British engineer, mathematician, physicist and inventor. She was awarded the Hughes Medal by the Royal Society for her work on electric arcs and ripples in sand and water.

After her father died in 1861, leaving her mother with 7 children to care for, Ayrton was tasked with helping to raise her siblings. Her mother, however, was determined that this should not stand in the way of her school work. She was taken to London by her Aunt who ran a school. By the age of 16, Hertha was working as a governor, but still had a desire to advance her education.

She was the first female member of the Institute of Electrical Engineers. After reading a paper to the IEE on her work on the electric arc in 1899, Ayrton was elected to full membership two days later. Unlike the Royal Society, the IEE focused on her scientific talent other than her gender.



At the outbreak of the First World War, Ayrton put her knowledge of oscillations in water to the movement of air to good use as part of Britain's war efforts- once she had convinced the military to consider her idea. After battling to gain acceptance, they finally agreed and 100000 were used on the Western Front to clear trenches of poisonous gas. She died from blood poisoning from an insect bite in 1923. Hertha was born to a Polish women, Alice Moss, and clock maker father in Portsea, Portsmouth, on April 28<sup>th</sup> 1854. She attended Girton College, University of Cambridge, in 1876 and pass the examination for women in 1874 with Honours in both English and Maths.

> In 1884, Hertha patented her first major invention, an instrument used for dividing lines into a number of equal parts. Hertha also realised that ripples appear when waves wash over sand.

The Scientist also took part in suffrage rallies in 1906 and 1913 and was the founding member of the International Federation of University for women and the National Union of Scientific Workers.

Hertha married physicist and engineer William Edward Ayrton in 1885. She studied under him and assisted on the research before working on her projects. William Ayrton died in 1908 at the age of 61. The couple had a daughter, Barbara Ayrton who became a suffragist and served in the British Parliament from 1945 to 1950.



# FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Despite this being an unusually short half-term, a great deal has happened at the school since the last edition of Springfield News was published.

I am delighted to inform families that the school was successful in a key element of its recent CIF (condition improvement fund) bid to the Department for Education. This will bring £922k to the school to conduct essential improvement works to the science block which will mean that the windows and curtain walling of the block will be completely replaced. Concurrently, the governors intend to invest in the modernisation of some of the science laboratories in order to enhance the internal as well as the external learning environment for the pupils – a much needed 'facelift'!



This is a complex project which is envisioned to start in the summer and run well into next term. At all times the health and safety of staff and pupils will be prioritised, so please anticipate some minor disruption on the school site; classes will inevitably have to be moved to alternative classrooms. The contractor is currently planning where some temporary rooms might be situated to minimise any interruption to the curriculum and this may affect parking. As the plans are finalised we will update pupils and parents on the details. Meanwhile we look forward to a fantastic looking 'new' block!

We are also currently engaging with Portsmouth City Council who are conducting a number of initial feasibility studies with local secondary schools. Over the next few years it is expected that more pupil places will be required in Portsmouth and so the Council is working with different schools to explore where those pupils might best be educated. I should emphasise that discussions are at very early stages and no specific plans have been proposed or agreed at this time; the Trust will inform and consult with the wider community as appropriate if ultimately expansion is considered.



#### ANTI-BULLYING

Springfield is proud of its anti-bullying strategy; in fact, this year bullying accounted for only 2% of recorded behaviour incidents. The recent Governor Safeguarding Review reported that pupils feel safe in school, and that incidents of bullying are very rare; when incidents do occur, pastoral teams are extremely effective in supporting students to repair relationships. Pupils have also told us that they value the House System, as they feel more able to talk to older pupils within the family structure of their House. With a complex issue like bullying however, there is always more that can be done and fresh approaches that can be adopted. The Inclusion Committee of the School Council, led by Harry Stoneman and Megan Parkes, has been working hard this year on this approach. We recognise that pupils do not always find it easy to report problems, and the committee will be working on a poster campaign to promote anti bullying strategies and to encourage pupils to speak up, as well as producing a 'Myth Buster' around the topic. As the Anti-Bullying and Equality lead, I will be working with the committee to create a pupil survey, the results of which will inform our work over the coming year. Other initiatives include worry boxes, and a renewed focus in assemblies, PDL lessons and Focus Days. We also continue to develop our restorative approaches, enabling pupils to more effectively resolve issues for themselves. To further develop this, I will be working hard next term to recruit and train peer mentors and anti-bullying representatives from each and every tutor group, including fostering closer links with our feeder schools, so that next year's Year 7 are also represented. Recently, the Senior Prefect Team presented on cyber bullying to parents at the Solent Schools. This was extremely well received, and feedback from parents and staff at Solent indicates that they would welcome the opportunity for anti-bullying work to take place across the schools. Although the majority of reported incidents are related to friendship breakdowns, we are mindful of the small number of prejudice based incidences of bullying. We are already a 'Stonewall' school, and will be looking to exploit this further, as well as using global events such as Black History Month to inform discussions in tutor time and PDL lessons.






### YEAR 7 SAILING TRIP

#### Leona Delija (7R) 'The Whisperer' by Nick Shadow


The genre of this book is thriller/horror. This book has three stories in one!







#### BAE IMPRESS WITH YEAR 10 MATHS

Year 10 GCSE Maths pupils at Springfield school had the benefit of working with a young engineer and a project manager from BAE Systems on Thursday 2nd May, 2019. Both work closely on the new aircraft carrier HMS Queen Elizabeth and had devised tasks involving algebra that they commonly used in their daily jobs. This was another lesson in a series aimed at engaging pupils in the contents of their curriculum and showing them that what they are learning can have direct links to the activities of many job roles from the business world. Therefore it is worth pupils sticking at their tasks in Maths. Even though algebra can seem long and abstract at times, it can help lead to superb job roles. With only 54% of the class stating before the session that they were confident in applying what they learn in Maths to the workplace, 96% really enjoyed the experience. 92% of the class said that they were able to learn about the relevance of algebra to the workplace and 79% said they had learned more about the opportunities available after leaving school. This was an able class and they were able to refine their career pathways and found the excellent role models from BAE Systems inspirational.
