FROM THE HEADTEACHER

When we fully reopened the school in <u>September</u> it was with a sense of optimism that COVID 19 infections were in decline and that life – both in and outside of school would slowly start to get back to normal as restrictions began to lift. Three months on, as what may or may not be possible in terms of a Christmas celebration continues to be debated, it is clear that many challenges still lie ahead over the coming months. I continue to feel very proud of how the staff, governors, pupils and parents within Springfield's community have pulled together to keep school the open and operating as safelv as possible given the many obstacles that have come our way; and I have no doubt that this extraordinary effort will continue into the New Year. I would like to thank



everyone for their ongoing support and understanding as we work to keep learning as engaging and focused as possible for our pupils – even when they are having to work remotely - during this difficult period.

Responding to confirmed cases of COVID 19 within the school community has, in accordance with Government and Public Health England expectations, led to staff and pupils having to self-isolate. Reducing the need for self-isolation. notably across the staff body, is essential if schools are to be able to remain open to all The Government . sliaua announced on 15 December that rapid testing will be available in schools next term in order to limit the need for self-isolation. Well done to our Year 11 pupils who, having had their 'bubble' temporarily closed on the advice of Public Health England, returned to school to commence their two weeks of mock exams and demonstrated a real determination to do well and learn from the 'exam hall experience'. Keep up the good work, Year 11!

Over recent weeks the Government has updated its plans for the summer GCSE series. In summary, and building on the three-week delay to exams to free up extra teaching time announced in October, the new measures include:

- more generous grading than usual, in line with national outcomes from 2020, so students this y e a r a r e n o t disadvantaged
- students receiving advance notice of some topic areas covered in GCSE, AS and A levels to focus revision

- exam aids, for example formula sheets, provided in some exams giving students more confidence and reducing the amount of information they need to memorise
- additional exams to give students a second chance to sit a paper if the main e x a m s o r assessments are missed due to illness or self-isolation
- a new expert group to look at differential learning and monitor the variation in the impact of the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak on students across the country

As reported in the July edition of Springfield News, Springfield has successfully been awarded two rounds of Condition Improvement Funding from the Government to transform 'A' Block into a set of modern science classrooms, including two state of the art STEM rooms in which technology can also be taught. The first phase, begun in February 2020, saw the successful replacement of the external wall cladding and windows. The second phase, following the announcement that the school had been successful in securing another one million pounds (approximately) funding, involves the complete refurbishment of the interior of the science block, providing high quality teaching spaces for pupils and new toilet facilities.

Upgrading these facilities is a significant undertaking which, as you would expect, has caused some disruption, with the hire of temporary classrooms and other facilities so learning can continue to take place. Furthermore, 'A' block was built and fitted out in the 1960s and the initial work to clear out the original fixtures and fittings has revealed urgent additional infrastructure work that needs to be undertaken before putting in the new classrooms.

Springfield's Governors fully support the school's vision for pupils and staff to benefit from an updated and future-proof facility for the teaching of science and one that is, of course, fully compliant with modern building and health and safety regulations. Governors are committed to overseeing the financial performance of the school and making sure its money is well spent and whilst there are sufficient funds available to cover these additional costs, Governors have supported a request for additional DfE funding to cover the cost of these remedial works.

I am delighted to report that Axio, our contractors, are currently working to schedule. So after the February half-term, pupils and staff should finally be able to enjoy this great new facility - one that will serve the school and its community for many years to come.

A World Religion Holiday Season Calendar

October / November HINDUS

Diwali Festival of Lights, change each year based on the Hindu Lunar calendar, but it usually occurs in October or November. Diwali is marked by five days of celebrations with illumination throughout. Diwali celebrates the triumph of good over evil.



November 5th SIKHS

Sikhs observe the birthday of Guru Nanak, the founder of Sikhism. The Sikh Holy Book is read continuously for over 48 hours. Processions are also held in India and England, which include singers, musicians, martial arts demonstrations and fireworks.

Late November / December **IFWS**

MINCE PIE RECIPE

Teacher of Design and Technology Miss Wines, has kindly shared her famous mince pie recipe with us! It is always a hit with pupils and their families.

◆250g plain flour
◆125g butter
◆1 egg
◆1 tbsp. icing sugar
◆1 small jar of minced meat

1. Pre heat the oven to 180C or Gas mark 4.

2. Sieve the flour into a mixing bowl. Put the fat into the mixing bowl.

3. Cut the fat into small pieces of around 1 cm, using a blunt table knife. Stir the fat cubes with a knife to coat with flour.

4. Use fingertips to rub butter and flour together, until it looks like bread crumbs. Shake the bowl and any lumps left will come to the top.

5. Add 1 tbsp. icing sugar to the flour and stir.

6. Beat an egg in a measuring jug and top up with a little cold water.

7. Add the egg and water mixture a little bit at a time and mix with a table knife until you can see more lumps than dry crumbs, and it will come together into a dough.

8. Knead very gently to bring it together.

9. Dust the worktop with flour using a flour dredger. Roll out the pastry using a rolling pin until 3mm thick (about the thickness of a pound coin).

10. Cut out 12 circles using a pastry cutter. Place circles into your dimple tin.

11. Fill each pastry case with 1 tsp of minced meat (no more as it will over boil).

12. Cut a smaller circle (or festive shape) for the lid of the minced pie.

13. Glaze the top using a pastry brush with leftover egg and water mixture.

14. Cook in the oven for 15 minutes until golden brown. Take care as the mince meat will be very hot from the oven and will burn your mouth if you eat them too quickly!

In addition to the ebooks available to keep all pupils reading, pupils can request books to borrow through their English teachers and Form Tutors. Pupils can search the library catalogue from the 'Library' link on the VLE. Searching is straightforward and can to conform to current be done by the title of the book, series or author. The green number under each book title shows how many copies of the book are currently available to borrow. CHARITY ASSEMBLIES

The senior prefects have recently prepared two assemblies for the Year 7 and 8 tutor groups explaining the thirteen different charities our school supports. Every student in Year 7 and 8 got the chance to vote for which charity they would like the funds to go to from our Christmas Jumper Day that has traditionally taken place on the last day of the autumn term every year. Each senior prefect researched the following charities:

Maddy Brown (11P) - I researched African Adventures which is a volunteer travel company that works with twenty six community projects in Africa such as schools in Ghana, Kenya and Zanzibar, providing them with the resources they need to grow. I also researched the Solent Mind charity which is part of a network of over one hundred local minds that provide trusted mental health services to communities.
