FROM THE HEADTEACHER

The first half of this term has flown by, with the new year bringing with it a sense of energy and optimism in the school. Our students have been working very hard and engaging with all elements of school life, which this term has ranged from meeting with visitors looking at how mathematics is taught in the school to boarding the 'Apprenticeship Bus'! As you will note from this edition of Springfield News, extra-curricular activities including trips, sport and drama have been thriving in the school. Everyone has earned their half-term holiday, and I hope that staff and pupils alike are able to take a break during the week.

The school received some exciting news at the very end of last term, which was posted on the school's website. Baroness Barran, Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State, wrote to the school in December to confirm that Springfield had been 'provisionally prioritised' to have its buildings replaced or refurbished. At this time, we have no further details of the timescale or scope of the project, but look forward to working with the Department for Education

(DfE) to improve our campus for the whole school community. Trustees, Governors and I would like to thank those colleagues who played an instrumental role in putting together our school's comprehensive and evidenced bid to the DfE.

For Year 11 students, this term started with their 'mock results day' and following assembly. Students were able to get a sense of where they are now with respect to their GCSE grades, reflect, and plan for how to make the most of the final months they have left at secondary school. We wish them every success with their endeavours and draw their attention again to the extensive revision support that Springfield offers during the school holidays, before and after school.

School staff were also studying hard at the start of the term. Springfield hosted this year's joint INSET (professional development) day for all De Curci Trust schools on 19 January. Staff from across the trust's three schools came together to share and develop good practice in areas including teaching literacy, effective assessment and feedback, cybersecurity and relational approaches which support pupils' wellbeing. My thanks to colleagues who contributed to making this such a successful event.

Springfield has also been developing and sharing good practice with colleagues from further afield, welcoming representatives from the Portsmouth Education Partnership for 'peer review' work in mathematics and also the Senior Partner of the Challenge Partners Hub (Wootton Bassett) to extend our trust's staff professional development opportunities. Challenge Partners is an education charity, led by practitioners, through which schools collaborate to improve each other and the education system as a whole, so all children benefit.



REVIEW OF THE SCHOOL DAY

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REVIEW OF THE CURRICULUM

At Springfield School our curriculum is continuously reviewed to ensure that it gives all learners the knowledge and cultural capital they need to succeed in life. The aim of curriculum review and design is to enhance student learning, engagement, experience and ultimately outcomes.

Our curriculum allows all of our pupils to be appropriately and ambitiously challenged to achieve their potential. At Key Stage 4 the EBacc, for which pupils are required to study English, Maths, Science, Humanities (Geography and/or History) and a Modern Foreign Language at GCSE, provides broad academic challenge; in addition, a targeted vocational offer enables pupils to reach their individual objectives for learning and career progression.

Part of the review process involves talking with staff and pupils to gain their input on the school's curriculum offer, in particular with respect to option choices.

Recent feedback shows that overall:

- Pupils like that option subjects are chosen at the end of Year 8 as this allows them to explore their subject choices and deepen their knowledge and understanding
- Pupils enjoy the wide range of option subjects available to them, including the opportunity to continue with creative subjects
- Pupils are allowed to move between option subjects where practicable to ensure that they are on a course that is suited to their interests
- Some pupils would like to see more vocational courses on offer

We also value feedback from parents and carers as part of our curriculum review process. YEAR 11 MATTERS

The GCSE exam timetable has been published (on the school's website under the 'Learning' tab select 'Examinations' (it is also shown on pages 22 and 23)) and it is clear that the five week exam period during May and June will be, as in previous years, a test of stamina as much as knowledge and understanding. Year 11 pupils should remember, when they consider the full exam schedule, that not all the exams listed are the ones they sit. Making a personal exam timetable is one of the best ways of de-cluttering the key weeks and making them appear more manageable.

As in previous years, we have timetabled some revision workshops over the February half term break, the programme for which is also on the website on the 'Examinations' page (it is also shown on page 21). This will be followed by a full programme for the Easter holidays as well as in the May half term break, more details of which will be published nearer the time.

In order to acclimatise Year 11 to exam conditions, we will be once again holding a Mock Week in the week beginning 6 March. Not all subjects will be covered but

the Sports Hall will be used and formal exam conditions will be insisted upon. Year 11 pupils should treat this week as a final 'dry run' before the 'real' exams and as a gauge as to where to focus their work efforts and priorities. Our Year 11 have been exemplary in the two previous mock exam periods in terms of behaviour and attitude and I fully expect them to rise to the occasion again. The mock exam timetable is also published under the 'Examinations' section of our website and a copy is shown below.

Finally, towards the Easter holidays, I will publicise the final revision timetable based around the terminal exams. The aim is for all exams to be prefaced by an extended revision slot staffed by subject specialists so that the pupils go into each exam as prepared as possible with recent subject content ringing in their ears!

I wish our Year 11 all the best as we start to approach the final few months of their secondary school careers.

GRAMMAR

Adjectives are words that describe nouns, such as: kind, clever, expensive.

Adverbs are words that modify verbs, adjectives or other adverbs, such as: quickly, never, too, badly, completely.

Prepositions are words usually in front of a noun or pronoun and expressing a relation to another word or element, such as: above, below, near, besides, under.

Pronouns are words that take the place of nouns, such as: me, you, his, it, this, that, mine, yours, who.

PORTSMOUTH BOOK AWARD




Once all the votes have been collated by the School Library Service, the winning author will be announced at the Celebration event to be held on 27 June at the University of Portsmouth's Park Building.




ANGLEPOISE LAMPS






CHRISTMAS BINGO




