PASS Survey

PASS survey proves positive!

During the earlier part of the Spring term over 650 of our students from years 7-10 took part in an online survey known as 'PASS' - Pupil Attitudes to Self and School. The school has previously completed the survey prior to the disruption caused by Covid-19.

The PASS survey is provided by a reputable and well regarded company called GL Assessment and the standardised questions are generated by experts in the field of educational research and psychology.

The rationale for using such a survey is for us to better understand how our pupils feel about themselves, the school and their engagement with the school curriculum. Outcomes are summarised on an individual, group and whole school basis. The summary report also allows us to make useful 'red, amber green' comparisons with other schools nationally. I am pleased to report that the vast majority of our students show a positive response to the PASS factors shown below.

In all the factors above our school response shows that we are 'green' (positive) when compared to other schools nationally.

However, for some individuals and groups we notice that their responses show that they feel less positive about themselves and/or school in some areas. We will continue to work closely, through our school pastoral teams, to further understand these feelings and look at ways in which we can act to improve our educational and pastoral support provision for these students. Students should also be encouraged to reflect on their own responses and consider how they might take responsibility for making changes or improvements in specific areas such as attendance or approaching school with a positive mindset for example.

Portsmouth Book Award

The 22nd Portsmouth Book Award (Longer Novel) for Year 8/9 pupils

A team of Year 9 pupils have been busy reading the four novels shortlisted for this year's Portsmouth Book Award. This annual event is organised by the Portsmouth School Library Service, and inspires pupils across the city's schools to focus on some of the best fiction titles published in the last year.

Pupil judges Penelope Andriunaviciute (9P), Cleo Fleming (9G), Evie Hyland (9P) and Isabel Joe (9E) met in Springfield Library on 28th April 2022 to consider the four titles in the running for this prestigious award, and to vote for their favourite.

The partnership between Springfield and African Adventures is one of the most enduring and 1,300 students in Nakuru in Kenya have benefited across five partner schools since 2013. Previous surveys from parents comment that Springfield students return from their trip more knowledgeable, empathetic, resilient and with great clarity on the life path they seek to take. Springfield's previous visits have helped to improve students' learning environments in Kenya through the construction and renovation of 14 classrooms and provided an exchange of learning between both sets of students that has enhanced their understanding of each respective culture. Springfield students and teachers have also taken out thousands of items of clothes, books and stationary that the partner schools could never afford.

After the school's last 2019 visit, parents and students made the collective decision to donate the surplus trip funds that were held on account, amounting to over £10,000 to the partner schools they were working with during the trip, which resulted in the construction of three further permanent classrooms that provide a base for 117 students to learn from each day. Given that they could have simply shared a refund of those monies, the gesture showed how much the trip and the work that Springfield has done, meant to them.

Last academic year, a pen pal exchange continued the partnership and 60 Springfield students and 60 students from The Walk Centre in Kenya exchanged letters and learnt more about their respective lives even when travel wasn't possible.

Springfield are planning a 2023 trip - keep your eye out for further details. The volunteer effort and resources that Springfield will provide, are invaluable to the partner schools and their recovery after the significant and detrimental impact of the last two years.

Junk Robots

Year 8 pupils have been looking at packaging over recent weeks during their Art lessons. They have been studying the pop-art genre and artists such as Sarah Graham and Marcello Barenghi who paint in the hyper -realist style. They have also thought about plastic pollution and artists who comment on environmental issues through their work.

In their lesson on Thursday 12th May, pupils used packaging collected from home to create 'Junk Robots' in relief using 3D modelling, adding papier mache for strength and texture. Some pupils, like Elowen Woodward (8R), have used the transparent properties of plastic in really inventive ways to show the inner workings of her robot. Others, such as Jada Miah (8R) have exploited the curve of a plastic bottle to skilfully create a rounded body and domed head, then used waste tin foil to form the metallic surface. It has been great to see the pupils problem solving and working out how they can make use of found materials to create new 3D art.
