## FROM THE HEADTEACHER

The countdown to Christmas has well and truly begun, as confirmed by the plethora of 'cracker jokes' that Year 8 pupils in particular have been sharing with me. The worst so far has to be, "Why shouldn't you eat Christmas decorations, Miss? ... because you might catch tinselitus!". Although staff and pupils alike are looking forward to some well-earned holiday, we have certainly enjoyed the variety of festive activities taking place in the last few weeks, ranging from the staff Christmas Bake-Off to the Year 8 Christmas Singing Competition. Our pupils, as ever, are keen to support others and so are taking part in raising money for a number of charities via the last day of term's non-uniform day. A number of these activities are featured in this edition of Springfield News, and so I hope you enjoy perusing what our pupils have been up to.

It's been a positive and busy term and we have recently welcomed a number of important visitors to our school. During the first week back after half-term we hosted the Challenge Partners Team, who were with us for three days conducting a 'QAR – Quality Assurance Review'. Challenge Partners is a practitioner-led charitable organisation which works to accelerate school improvement, leadership development and pupil progress, and all schools within the De Curci Trust are linked within its national Network of Excellence. Colleagues spent time meeting with a range of staff and pupils, as well as observing lessons and the school in action. We were delighted that the team found the leadership in Springfield School to be 'Leading' - the highest estimate that can be issued – and were able to give positive and constructive feedback regarding our provision. The report highlighted that:

'Leaders have high aspirations, passion and a deep sense of care for their students. This means that they take an individualised approach, where relationships with the student and family are at the heart of what they do, whether it is in relation to the curriculum, learning needs, attendance or any other aspect of school life. This core vision and ethos means that students enjoy their time at school and feel valued and listened to'.

We enjoyed seeing many of our former Year 11 Pupils on 23 November at our Awards Evening. Our special guest was also a Springfield alumna; World Champion and double Olympian swimmer Katie Sexton MBE was born in Portsmouth and attended Springfield School as a pupil, spending time swimming in the school pool when we were still lucky enough to have one. She first competed for her country at 13 years old and went on to be first British female swimmer to win a World Championship Gold medal. Katie was able to share her passion for swimming and sport with our leavers and also talk to them about the importance of resilience and perseverance; working through a serious injury and being able to return to competitive swimming was a highlight of her career. We were grateful to Katy for generously giving her time to celebrate our young people's success with them; they were certainly very happy to meet such an accomplished and inspiring guest.

Education is rarely out of the news, and families may have seen the Portsmouth News headline (13 December), 'Not learning their lessons', which linked to an article highlighting that the number of pupils missing school without permission is well above average in Portsmouth and has risen significantly since Covid-19; it also reported an increase in the number of suspensions being issued in Portsmouth Schools. There are a number of complex factors contributing to this problem, and schools cannot address them in isolation. However, families will understand that children cannot make good progress in their formal learning and personal development unless they attend school and, when in school, engage with their lessons and learning. While at Springfield the picture is slightly more positive than at some other secondary schools, attendance is not as good as it was prior to the pandemic, and we are concerned that some children are missing out over the longer term. There is a direct correlation between good attendance and good progress/GCSE results, and consequently the future opportunities available to pupils. Parents are legally responsible for making sure that their children attend school. We understand that this is not always straightforward and would like to thank parents/carers sincerely for their ongoing support in ensuring that their child attends school on time every day (other than in exceptional circumstances). If parents need additional support with this, please contact a member of your child's Year Office Team in the first instance who will be happy to signpost support.

Families will be aware that Springfield is part of the DfE's School Rebuilding Programme and we remain 'cautiously optimistic' as we move from the prefeasibility to the feasibility stage and learn more about how the DfE team manage potential projects of this scale. A variety of surveys remain underway and we have been advised that the design and planning stage is likely to run until September 2025. I will share further information with our community as it becomes available, noting again that the project itself has yet to be formally confirmed.

I hope that you enjoy reading this edition of Springfield News. The Spring Term commences on Tuesday, 2 January 2024, a thought which happily brings to mind the words of Oliver Herford; "I heard a bird sing in the dark of December. A magical thing. And sweet to remember. We are nearer to Spring than we were in September. I heard a bird sing in the dark of December."

## **HOME-SCHOOL JOURNEY**

### Home-school journey including arrival and departure from school

Whilst we remain 100% committed to keeping all our children safe in school we also extend our duty of care to ensuring that pupils arrive and leave safely from school. To this end we run a school day duty rota with staff deployed in strategic 'school gate/entrance' positions at the beginning and end of each day. Staff are easily identifiable as they wear our hi-vis duty vests. Parents and carers have the responsibility to ensure that their children travel safely to and from school and, where applicable and appropriate, our pupils themselves must take personal responsibility for these journeys. I have listed below some pertinent reminders categorised by mode of transport:

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#### On foot (as a pedestrian)

Observe the highway code, stick to pavements and always cross a road where road users can see you.

#### Cycling

Observe the highway code and ensure that you are wearing suitable personal protective equipment including a well-fitting helmet and hi-vis as required. You should also have lights on those darker days. Bicycles should not be ridden on site.

#### 'Drop-off/pick-up' by car

We would ask that any parents/carers (or otherwise) who drop-off or pick up by car to do so on Central Road and to be considerate of other road users and pedestrians (including our pupils leaving the site).

Please note that pupils are prohibited from bringing motorbikes/mopeds and e-scooters (or equivalent) onto the school site at any time.

## **ONLINE SAFETY**

#### Filtering and monitoring update.

As part of our ongoing drive to ensure that all our pupils continue to be safe online, we have recently introduced new software to allow us to more effectively monitor pupil activities in this context.

Internet filtering is the process of checking and 'blocking' potentially harmful websites and online activities. This function is currently undertaken by Portsmouth City Council as part of the school wide area network (SWAN). We remain responsive and dynamic in this regard as the internet continues to evolve and change.

Monitoring is the process of 'watching' what our pupils are doing when they are online and completing tasks using a range of software. The purpose of this is to ensure that pupils are working effectively and learning (in the same way that a teacher would watch and observe completion of a bookwork task for example). The second purpose is to ensure that staff can pick up on any activity which may give potential cause for concern from a safeguarding perspective. This could, for example, be a repeated attempt to access an inappropriate website or the use of a particular word or phrase. Monitoring can take various forms including; staff observation of a pupils screen: observation of multiple screens via central monitoring software and 'automated' monitoring.

The automated software currently used by the school for this purpose is pre-programmed with a wide range of keywords, phrases and is categorised by type. The software covers online activity and also monitors work done on other types of applications/software used by pupils in school. Trained staff in school carry out routine checks and follow up with further investigation and intervention as required. Should we have concerns we will, as with the majority of safeguarding matters, make contact with parents/carers at the earliest opportunity. If deemed necessary we may also be required to refer the matter on to an external agency in a timely manner.

The best form of support for online safety in general is 'education' and all staff take responsibility for this along with teams (and visitors) who deliver specific inputs for our pupils. Parents also have a vital role in checking, monitoring and talking about online safety be it on a PC, mobile phone or other device. ## **CAREERS ASSEMBLIES**

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This half term, Springfield pupils have attended a number of assemblies to help them consider future plans.

#### Year 11

Year 11 pupils heard a talk from local organisation Unloc, promoting a careers-focused residential experience called Portsmouth Inspires <u>https://unloc.online/portsmouth-inspires-funded-by-ncs</u>. Pupils opting to attend will experience a series of encounters with local businesses, including Southsea Deli and Victorious Festival. We are pleased to hear that 15 pupils from Springfield have signed up. If any Year 11 pupils were disappointed to miss out on a free residential experience on this occasion, a similar opportunity will be offered in an assembly in January (run by the National Citizen Service). On 24 November, a speaker (Georgia Flint) from Havant and South Downs College came to outline the courses the college offers on its two sites and to explain what a day at college looks like in practice. Georgia reminded pupils that they can ask to change courses after an application or an offer has been made, and also emphasised that it is possible to put in more than one application for post-16 study or training.

Pupils in Years 10 and 11 interested in studying medicine in the future were able to attend an online talk with a doctor last week. They heard about the various elements of a degree in medicine, ranging from physiology and pathology to histology and pharmacology. We were also given advice as to the importance of work experience and volunteer work so that pupils can demonstrate empathy and commitment at interview.

The majority of pupils in Year 11 have seen Sarita Khosla-Malhotra, our independent careers advisor, on a one to one basis. If any Year 11s have yet to make an appointment or need additional support with an application, they should go to the school library on a Thursday or a Friday to make contact with Sarita. Cont...

#### Year 10

On 23 November, Kim Hill from the University of Portsmouth gave an assembly on future pathways, including university as an option. She gave examples of students who have followed their passion when making their degree choice and who have gone on to be successful in their field. An example of this was a fashion student who was shortlisted for a national award for designing sustainable clothing and a biology student who was able to work on an exciting environmental project. On 8 December, Year 10 pupils heard about apprenticeships as an option for when they leave school: they will have a chance to speak directly with local apprenticeship providers at a school event in early February. 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#### Year 9

On Wednesday, 22 November PC Lamper and PCSO Sarahs visited to talk to Year 9 pupils about careers in policing. PC Lamper spoke about the different routes into the force as an officer, from more direct entry to being 'on the beat' to joining investigation teams though a graduate route. We heard about the challenges of the job but also about the rewards of making strong friendships and the satisfaction of helping victims of crime. Options such as joining the armed unit and the dog unit were outlined. PCSO Sarahs, who is going to be Springfield's new point of contact with the force, told pupils how important it is to stay physically fit in the role. On 13 December, they then heard a talk about apprenticeships from the 'not for profit' organisation PETA. Pupils were told about the kind of careers an apprenticeship can lead to, the fact that an apprenticeship can be opted for at many stages (not just at the end of Year 11) as well as the entry requirements. #### Year 8

Year 8 pupils, who will make option choices next term, had a useful talk from City of Portsmouth College about factors to consider when choosing subjects. Portsmouth College has merged with Highbury and is now one college, with four different campuses. School leavers can opt for A levels, T Levels, apprenticeships or vocational qualifications if they choose this college. #### Year 7

Year 7 pupils attended an assembly on 20 November run by an outreach worker from the University of Portsmouth. The speaker made pupils aware of the importance of thinking ahead and outlined the different routes available after leaving Springfield. On 4 December, they then heard a talk about apprenticeships from the not for profit organisation PETA. Pupils were told about the kind of careers an apprenticeship can lead to, that they can be opted for at many stages, not just at the end of Year 11, and the entry requirements. ### NATIONAL SPACE ACADEMY

## Students are enthused by inspirational masterclass in science education.

On Tuesday, 14 November we were very fortunate to host Ed Gentle and Ellie Peacock from the National Space Agency at Springfield to deliver their talk about the physics and complexities of space. We participated in various experiments to develop our understanding of phenomena in space and links it made with physics, especially at GCSE. We demonstrated this by getting involved in measuring the effect of the thickness of lenses when measuring magnification to imitate a telescope (heavily used to photograph space), we created a gravity well using marbles to mimic the elliptical orbit of planets in our solar system, and used light spectrum glasses to understand the role that refraction plays by breaking light into its different visible electromagnetic waves. During this experience, I was fortunate to be able to put on an astronaut suit which used very advance technology to keep it insulated which is especially useful when faced with extreme weather conditions. At the end of this experience I had developed an understanding of the importance of the National Space Agency in regards to up-and-coming developments in space technology and I deepened my knowledge of physics which I have applied to my academics. I would recommend this to everyone who has the opportunity to participate in it!
















## HOMEWORK






