FROM THE HEADTEACHER

It's hard to believe that it's been six weeks since term began on the back of the New Year 2024 celebrations. Our students have been working very hard and engaging with all elements of school life, which has ranged from meeting with important visitors to talking about safeguarding in the school to boarding the 'Apprenticeship Bus'! As you will note from this publication of Springfield News, extra-curricular activities including trips, sport and drama have been flourishing in the school. Everyone has earned their half-term break, and I hope that students and staff alike are able to enjoy some rest and relaxation during the time.

At the end of last term, Year 11 students sat their mocks and were able to get a sense of where they were with respect to their GCSE grades, and they started the year with refreshed 'learning resolutions' for how to make the most of the final months they have left at Springfield before the GCSEs commence. We wish them every success with their endeavours and draw their attention again to the wide-ranging revision support that Springfield offers during the school holidays, before and after school.

School staff were also studying hard at the start of the term (page 20). All staff from The De Curci Trust (Solent Infant School, Solent Junior School and Springfield School) came together to learn, with thought provoking presentations from Chris Lubbe, Beth Thomas Hancock and John Lynch. The theme of the professional development conference was 'Promoting and Delivering Equality, Diversity and Inclusion'. Feedback was extremely positive with colleagues reflecting on the key messages and actions that they will take forward in their work.

The De Curci Trust has also been developing and sharing good practice with colleagues from Hampshire, welcoming four Designated Safeguarding Leads from the Inspire Learning Partnership to meet with students, staff and Governors from all three schools to peer review safeguarding and pastoral care processes; in March our DSL staff will conduct reciprocal visits to a number of ILP schools. We were delighted by our report, which stated 'There is a strong culture of safeguarding at the De Curci Trust. Safeguarding is an active priority at every level of the organisation and has a tangible and positive impact upon staff and students. Stakeholders are rightly proud of their schools and leaders are unwavering in their desire to improve matters further'.

An absolute February highlight has been the students' production and performance of 'Into the Woods', a 1987 musical with music and lyrics by Stephen Sondheim and book by James Lapine. It was not a musical with which I was familiar personally, but it quickly came apparent to me that the story mixes the plots of a number of classic fairy tales and follows the tale of a couple's quest to have a child. The score was technically very challenging to perform and the students showcased their fantastic talents for acting, singing and dancing – not to mention keeping going when challenged by a few technical difficulties! – to the joy and amusement of the audience. Well done and thank you to everyone involved – we look forward to many more productions, large and small, from the Drama and Music departments in the future.





YEAR 11 MATTERS

The <u>GCSE exam timetable</u> has been published (on the school's website under the 'Learning' tab select 'Examinations') and it is clear that the five week exam period during May and June will be, as in previous years, a test of stamina as much as knowledge and understanding. Year 11 pupils should remember, when they consider the full exam schedule, that not all the exams listed are the ones they sit. Making a personal exam timetable is one of the best ways of de-cluttering the key weeks and making them appear more manageable.

As in previous years, we have timetabled some revision workshops over the February half term break, the programme for which is also on the website on the '<u>Examinations</u>' page (it is also shown on pages 15 and 16). This will be followed by a full programme for the Easter holidays as well as in the May half term break, more details of which will be published nearer the time.

In order to acclimatise Year 11 to exam conditions, we will be once again holding a Mock Week Immediately following the February half term break, Year 11 will commence their third mock series of exams beginning with English Language Paper 1 on Monday, 19 February. The <u>mock exam timetable</u> is also published under the 'Examinations' section of our website and a copy is shown on pages 17 and 18.

Finally, towards the Easter holidays, I will publicise the final revision timetable based around the terminal exams. The aim is for all exams to be prefaced by an extended revision slot staffed by subject specialists so that the pupils go into each exam as prepared as possible with recent subject content ringing in their ears!

I wish our Year 11 all the best as we start to approach the final few months of their secondary school careers.

It is never too late to benefit from good attendance:

More than half of pupils who were persistently absent (<90% attendance) from school in Year 10 and then rarely absent in Year 11 passed at least 5 GCSEs, compared to 36% who were persistently absent from school in Year 10 and 11 (2). Attendance is important for more than just attainment - regular school attendance can facilitate positive peer relationships which is a protective factor for mental health and wellbeing (3).

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PROMOTING AND DELIVERING EQUALITY, DIVERSITY & INCLUSION

INSET day on 19 January gave The De Curci Trust's staff the opportunity to come together and focus on their own, as opposed to their pupils', learning for the day! The theme of the professional development was 'Promoting and Delivering Equality, Diversity and Inclusion', and colleagues were delighted to welcome a most distinguished guest, Chris Lubbe, to give the conference's keynote address. Chris has spent his life involved in the relentless struggle against discrimination; born in South Africa, he led students and others in protest against the unjust system of apartheid. He spent a number of years as bodyguard to Nelson Mandela, travelling the world with him and meeting a variety of notable world leaders and dignitaries, including Queen Elizabeth II, the Dalai Lama and Desmond Tutu. Chris used his personal experiences to inspire colleagues with a message of determination, courage and the power of forgiveness. He also talked about the philosophy of Ubuntu. Writing on social media, Chris wrote, 'It was such a privilege to speak at The De Curci Trust staff INSET day which was held at the Marriott Hotel Portsmouth ... Keep up the incredible work that you do in educating our children'. Colleagues then worked with John Lynch and Beth Thomas Hancock from Rise Training Group to examine the causes of unconscious bias and discuss conscious inclusion approaches to mitigate against it in schools and elsewhere.

IET FARADAY CHALLENGE

On Tuesday, 9 January 2024 some of our Year 8 students attended an Institution of Engineering and Technology (IET) Faraday Challenge. IET Faraday[®] Challenge Days are run by regional delivery partners across the UK with up to six teams of local school students competing at each event to find the best solution to an engineering-related challenge. This year's challenge is in association with The Rees Jeffreys Road Fund and National Highways, but the brief for these young engineers is hidden in secrecy to avoid unfair preparation and research. Teams must race against the clock to solve a real-life engineering problem, putting their engineering and technology knowledge and skills to the test.

The events aim to encourage more young people to study and consider exciting and rewarding careers in science, technology, engineering and maths (STEM) by using creativity, innovation and problem-solving skills. The winning team from each event will gain a place on the season's league table. The top teams from across the UK will receive an all-expenses paid trip to the national final in June 2024 to compete for a cash prize of up to £1,000 for their school.

The IET Faraday[®] Challenge Days are part of a wider Education programme, made up of a whole host of teaching resources and activities to inspire and attract the engineers of tomorrow.

Lillia Maggs (8L), Emma Butcher (8L), Gracie Green (8L), David Ban (8P), Harrison Bath (8P) and Oliver Astle (8P) were up against six local schools in the community, and I am pleased to say with team work, excellent ideas and a fantastic presentation, Springfield School won the event! The scheme is for households who are struggling financially and are unable to afford essential daily living costs or an essential household purchase, due to an unmanageable drop in income or increase in household costs.

Households wishing to submit an application should follow this link - Household Support Fund - apply for the exceptional Hardship Scheme or search for Household Support Fund on the Portsmouth City Council website. Portsmouth City Council recommend applications are made online. However, for those who are unable to do so they can make an application by ringing the dedicated HSF helpline on 023 9268 8010. Residents can make applications during three 'windows', with the first one having closed on 22 December, and the second opening on 15 January. In between windows, residents can register their interest to be notified when the scheme re-opens at Household support fund - Portsmouth City <u>Council</u>.
