From The Headteacher



Despite being the longest term of the year, this term has gone extraordinarily quickly! We started September on a real high from the excellent results achieved by our Year 11 pupils in the summer: 47% of our pupils attained Grade 5 or above in English and Maths (England average 39%); 38% of our pupils attained the EBacc at Grade 5/C or above (England average 19%); and the school's 'progress 8' score was above average and in the top 30% of schools in England. I hope that you enjoyed the last edition of Springfield News that celebrated our pupils' successes and highlighted how well Springfield achieved in the local context.

Our current Year 11 pupils now have a very high bar to meet and I wish them every success in their mock examinations this December. The mocks enable pupils to practise answering GCSE questions under timed conditions and in the formal setting of the exam hall. At Springfield, we run a 'mock results'

days' for pupils; pupils receive their mock grades in an envelope as they will do their GCSE results in August. We have found this approach to be positively received by the pupils; it gives a helpful steer as to how well they are doing at this point of their course and just how much study and preparation is required going forward. I am very grateful to the staff who are running before and after school sessions to provide extra support for the GCSE pupils.

Highlights of this term have included our Open Evening in October during which we welcomed hundreds of prospective pupils to the school and our current pupils did a wonderful job talking to families about the highlights and new experiences of secondary school. Also, our memorable Awards Evening in November was shared with Dr Oscar Mwaanga, Associate Professor at Southampton Solent University, CEO of Edumove and social entrepreneur. Dr Mwaanga shared with the audience his reflections on growing up in Zambia and the life lessons that could be learned by taking inspiration from how the fish eagle, the bird featured in the national flag of Zambia, lives its life; the eagle flying represents the people's abilities to rise above problems. The pupils in particular found his presentation to be inspirational and accessible; we hope that Dr Mwaanga can work with more of our pupils in the future.

Work on converting the defunct pool into a new small sports hall started in September and it is planned that pupils will be able to start using the new facility in the Spring. Pupils have also appreciated the new corridors and classrooms in B block which have improved circulation as well as modernised two teaching spaces.

It is remarkable to reflect that it was around a year ago that the school was consulting with the Springfield School community regarding forming a multi-academy trust. Two terms in, the positive benefits of closer working with our partnership schools, Solent Infant School and Solent Junior School, are beginning to be realised. Staff have taken part in joint professional development and school/learning review work, the senior leadership teams have reviewed the development of assessment approaches together and some joint activities involving pupils have taken place, including the Year 6 Head Girl and Head Boy joining Springfield pupils to interview candidates for The De Curci Trust's Chief Financial Officer post. Springfield also continues to work with the Portsmouth Educational Partnership, one strategic aim of which is to improve teacher recruitment in the locality. Families will be aware from the national press that qualified teachers are in very short supply; for example, the Times Educational Supplement reported on a survey last month under the headline 'Two-thirds of school leaders believe teacher recruitment crisis will deepen over next two years'. We are not immune from this issue at Springfield (although we are in a considerably stronger position than many schools) and the governors and I are aware that over recent months the school has had more interim staff than usual working in the school. Realising that some children can feel unsettled by change, we ask parents to reassure their children that these colleagues are trained teachers and encourage them to be as welcoming as possible while new staff settle in.

We are looking forward to the festivities of the last week of term, including pupils arranging Christmas events for our stakeholders and elderly neighbours, as well as the charity non-uniform day on the last day of term. I wish everyone a good holiday and a very happy Christmas.

Many thanks to staff and pupils who also raised £153.41 for the Poppy Appeal this year.







Motte and Bailey Castles

We have been looking at the Battle of Hastings and what happened afterwards. Motte and bailey castles tied in with this topic because they were introduced to Britain by William The Conqueror, the Norman who won the Battle of Hastings. To help us understand these castles we were tasked with crafting our own mini replicas of a medieval motte and bailey castle. I made mine using cardboard for the houses, green icing and green felt for the base and card and straws for the labels. 

Jewellery & Makeup

I wanted to take this opportunity to remind students and parents of our rules and expectations regarding jewellery and make-up (the following extract is taken from our current uniform policy/guidelines): Discreet make-up may be worn. No pupils may wear nail varnish, false nails or false eyelashes. No extreme haircuts or unnatural dyed hair colours are acceptable. The Headteacher retains the final judgement regarding 'extreme' haircuts. Shaved patterns or heads are definitely not acceptable. Hair should be cut no shorter than a No. 3.

Jewellery - a watch and one pair of plain stud earrings are the only items of jewellery permitted. Studs that enlarge the pieced hole in the ear are not permitted. Other jewellery worn will be confiscated. Further visible body-piercings are not acceptable.

Students should not be surprised or upset when they are challenged by staff on this matter. Students will then be required to resolve any identified issues at the earliest opportunity. Students who refuse to meet expectations or follow instructions will receive sanctions up to and including internal isolation.

Springfield's Year 11 have impressed staff since the beginning of the autumn term with their commitment to their studies. In previous years, Year 11 have attended lesson 6 sessions, mostly after the Christmas break hard on the heels of New Years resolutions. Our current Year 11 have shown a real appetite for asking for, and attending, lesson 6 sessions that departments have been running since the beginning of the term. Not only this, but Year 11 pupils have been regularly seen heading into school for 8am as part of lesson 0 provision. Sceptics amongst us might think that this is because of the impending mocks (begun on the 4th December for two weeks) but lesson 0 has also been running since the beginning of term, proof that our Year 11 are serious about doing well in next summer's examinations.

As the year progresses, especially towards the summer term, departments will all want pupils to attend their lesson 0/6 sessions and pupils will need to make choices as to which to attend. They will find that there are never enough hours in the day! To help counteract this, subjects will also put on revision workshops in holidays as the exams approach – something that, historically, has proven very popular with pupils. Thank you to our teachers, who offer this provision in their own time.

With lesson 0, registration intervention sessions, lesson 6, the easy accessibility of Google Classroom for homework setting, Year 11 have a wide range of support and guidance at their disposal – not to mention the 5 normal timetabled lessons during the course of the day!

To state again, Year 11 have made a really pleasing start to this important year. They have momentum and commitment and an increasing awareness that hard work in preparing for the new exams will pay dividends.*

Professional Qualifications

Life long learning - that's what we talk to our pupils about all the time. Whether it be about pursuing learning directly connected to the individual subjects they are studying or new learning connected to future job roles that have yet to be invented; what we try to provide our young people with are the tools and skills to manage that new learning way beyond their school years. As parents and carers you will doubtless have shared many a story of how things have changed in your lifetimes, all of which will have involved learning new ways of doing things. How hypocritical would it be then if that did not also apply to teachers too?!

As a profession we regularly participate in new learning. Our CPD (Continuing Professional Development) takes many forms and can encompass whole school activities such as on the afternoon of 28th November when we investigated the literacy and numeracy demands of Key Stage 2 (in conjunction with primary colleagues) and Key Stage 4. Small group activities are always on the go; we run regular twilight training

opportunities and are involved in several city-wide projects. It is also possible for individual teachers to pursue specific CPD training. In particular the nationally recognised and accredited NPQML and NPQSL programmes (National Professional Qualification for Middle Leaders / Senior Leaders) provide fantastic opportunities for participants to develop and hone their leadership skills over an extended period of time.

New Rewards Initiative

Staff and students have been working hard this term in preparation for an exciting new rewards initiative to be launched in the new year. Following a highly successful pilot in Year 8, our staff, students, and governors have taken the decision to introduce a 'house' structure to Springfield. Students may well be most familiar with the house system from the Harry Potter books, but in fact Springfield used to have a similar system some years ago. This will not replace the year system of pastoral organisation that the school has now; it will be used to encourage healthy competition, a sense of community and mixed age working.

All staff and students will be placed in one of five brand new 'houses', each with its own distinct name and identity. Central to the success of this new system will be strong student leadership, teamwork and a willingness to 'get involved'. As the system develops we want to foster a strong sense of belonging and ownership within each house and utilise the system to further energise, motivate and support our students.

Using digital 'house points', staff will reward students in lessons for hard work, effort and progress. Beyond the classroom, the system will be used to recognise and reward participation, community service and success in extracurricular events and activities. There will also be competition and I suspect that the inaugural 'house' based sports day could be a noisy affair! As with so many other aspects of Springfield life we want students to take a lead in shaping the future direction of this initiative. We are all very excited about its potential to make our great school even better!





TINY WORLDS



BELGIUM

On the 29th September, a group of Year 10 history pupils took a trip to Belgium to learn about trench warfare in World War 1 (WW1).

On the first day we took a detour into Canada, to Vimy Ridge, a preserved trench system that was manned by Canadian troops. There was a large monument engraved with the names of fallen troops. The land was given to Canada as a gift for their sacrifice. On the second day, after enjoying breakfast at the hotel, we travelled to Tyne Cot Cemetery, which held hundreds of gravestones, representing Allied soldiers of all ages. It was moving to see the extent of the effects of the war on the people and how many lives it had taken. We also went to Langemark, a German cemetery. This had a mass grave, and many of the soldiers were marked 'unknown'. After visiting the cemeteries, we drove to Passchendaele Museum, which showed us the detailed and busy lives of typical soldiers and citizens of the war. In the afternoon on day two we first visited the Sanctuary Wood Museum, outside of which was a set of preserved WW1 trenches and tunnels. They had been cleared of bombs so we could walk around the entire area and it was one of the more immersive parts of the trip. Afterwards we went to Essex Farm Cemetery, where the Canadian doctor John McCrae wrote his famous poem, 'In Flanders Fields'. Finally we went to Ypres, which was heavily bombed during the war. We attended the daily Last Post ceremony under the Menin Gate, which has taken place every night since 1929 (apart from under Nazi occupation). On the last day, we visited La Coupole Museum in northern France where we learnt about the creation of German rockets and the 'space race' after WW2. Afterwards, we went to a German blockhaus - an enormous concrete building with bombproof walls 16ft thick, built for making, storing, and launching V2 rockets. It was fascinating to see the damage made by the American bombs on this building and learn how the Nazis used slave labour to build it.

It was a great trip and we would like to thank Mr Walters, Mrs Byerley, Mrs Lee and Mr Dennett for their assistance throughout the trip.
