






FROM THE HEADTEACHER



I hope that everyone in the Springfield community was able to take at least some time for fun and relaxation over the Easter holiday and bank-holiday weekend. I used the opportunity to catch up with some reading on a subject close to home for all of us who work in Education: 'Inventing Ourselves – The Secret Life of the Teenage Brain' by the award-winning neuroscientist Sarah-Jayne Blackmore. For any teacher, parent or young person who would like to understand more about how the adolescent brain works

and what influences 'teenage behaviour', I believe I can recommend the book as an engaging read. What I especially found interesting was the neuroscience underpinning how adolescence is a period of real creativity and formative development; as well as the factors that sway young people's risk taking behaviour and the profound influence of peers and friendships. While the 'typical' teenage behaviours are all too familiar to teachers and parents, the emerging understanding of why adolescents think as they do was thought-provoking - and also reassuring that so much which adults might find difficult to manage can be blamed on neurones!



We are now fully into the GCSE exam period for Year 11 pupils and we wish them good luck in all of their subjects. I know that parents and pupils will join me in thanking the staff for their on-going hard work and support for the pupils; responding to the significant changes to the curriculum, its assessment and the 9-1 GCSE grading system has added considerably to teachers' already heavy workloads and yet they have still been willing to offer additional support to pupils before and after school and during the holidays. 

Thank you to the parents who responded to my invitation in the last edition of Springfield News to contribute to the school's review on whether mobile phones should be banned in school. The School Council and staff have also had the opportunity to contribute to the debate and governors will be making a decision on 'next steps' imminently. We will update families regarding any decisions in due course.

We have also recently started a conversation in school as to how we as a community can reduce the unnecessary use of plastics. In my recent assembly with pupils, we reflected on the disturbing images of the harmful effects of plastic pollution in the oceans as highlighted in the BBC's recent Blue Planet II series. Pupils have already started to come forward to offer their suggestions and energy; a number of pupils have been litter picking on the field and also on a beach over the bank holiday weekend. We hope that by making simple changes we can play our part as a community in addressing this issue; again, we welcome ideas and support from parents and the wider community.





Having had the privilege of watching the 'Mandem' team's final presentation being rehearsed for the Student Investor Challenge, I would like to reiterate my personal congratulations to the team on coming second in the national competition; an outstanding achievement! The understanding of stock markets and financial investments demonstrated by the pupils was truly impressive; the team also exemplified teamwork and conveyed enthusiasm and confidence in their presentation. 
I hope that you enjoy reading about our wonderful pupils' achievements in this edition of Springfield News and remind you also to follow our daily updates on the school's website.







STUDENT INVESTORS - THE MANDEM FUND

On 27th April 2018, four Springfield pupils went to London's institute of Banking and Finance to compete in the final of the Student Investor Challenge. The day started with breakfast and a chance to meet the other teams and industry professionals who were there to support teams throughout the day. The competition started after a quick introduction from the organisers and practice with the computer system. The first round consisted of three short challenges in which each team had to make financial choices based on real world news. Though the Springfield team, 'The Mandem Fund', had an unlucky second challenge they managed to come third overall in the morning challenges. After a short lunch break we then went onto the second round - the presentations. Each team was given a scenario in which they had to give financial advice to a client who had their own wants and needs. Each team had eight minutes to present their plan to a selection of judges from different areas of the finance sector, as well as the other teams. 'The Mandem Fund', gave an excellent presentation during which they showed everyone just how far they had come since the start of the competition in October. When the presentations had finished the judges needed time to decide on a winner and this gave the teams time to reflect on the day. After the decision was made all the teams gathered for the results and I am pleased to say that 'The Mandem Fund' came a very close second place, winning a trip to London and some money that will be donated to charity. I am very proud of all the effort the team has put in over the last year and pleased to see them do so well in a national competition that started with over 8,000 teams. YEAR 11 TEXTILES WORK

As always I am extremely proud of my GCSE Textile pupils. The standard of work completed this year for their Controlled Assessment has been exemplary and in some cases even 'A' level standard. Pupils have followed specific exam board briefs such as 'Modern Vintage', 'All things Bright and Beautiful', 'Winter Wonderland', 'Culture' and 'Best of British'. They have taken these briefs and made them their own, creating a final practical piece and a supporting portfolio.

The briefs selected allowed pupils to show problem solving skills and perfect their constructive and decorative skills to a commercially viable standard. Textiles is a demanding and complex GCSE subject and is for the passionate and productive; all pupils this year have shown these qualities and should be proud of their achievements, whilst still preparing for every other subject.

Due to the government changes this specific GCSE course will no longer be running and has been replaced with a Design Technology GCSE, in which pupils still have the opportunity to specialise in Product Design or Textiles. The Design Technology GCSE will continue to enable pupils to develop their design ideas to be on trend and show innovation. Our current Year 10 pupils will soon be underway with their final Controlled Assessment. Maybe the next James Dyson, Alexander McQueen or Allassandra Rich will soon be stepping out of Springfield School!

Once again, a massive well done to my lovely Year 11 pupils who have made the last year of running this particular GCSE course amazing.

TOMBSTONING



Portsmouth City Safe Clean Tidy team need to bring to your attention that concerns of tombstoning have been widely reported to them by members of the public and local councillors to the extent that these are now safety priorities for the summer. Community Wardens will be working closely with Police and partner agencies to help prevent and stop injury through tombstoning and the antisocial behaviour associated with it.

The Maritime Coastal Agency also has a tombstoning page which features fatality and injury statistics. This also has an injury survivor case study and link to the high impact radio filler on the dangers of tombstoning:

Young people who continue to breach the byelaws in relation to this matter could be subject to acceptable behaviour contracts or considered for legal action to prevent injury or harm being caused.

On Tuesday 1st May, a selection of Year 11 students were invited to Portsmouth College to attend a presentation about life at Russell Group universities. Firstly, a postgraduate student from the University of Southampton told us about life at a Russell Group university and how it differs from others. This was a really informative talk

which helped us think about whether life at one of these universities would be right for us. The Liaison Officer from Oxford University then explained how Oxbridge (Oxford and Cambridge Universities) vary from other universities and how the application process is different. Again, this was informative because it made us aware of the earlier Oxbridge application deadline. Overall, the event was really useful and we are all grateful that Portsmouth College invited us to attend.

This year's Young Geographer of the Year competition gives pupils the opportunity to explore the geography of the Arctic, and discover what makes this polar environment so unique.

The Arctic is an environment like no other. It is home to four million people, supports an abundance of uniquely adapted wildlife, and plays an important role in moderating the world's climate. However, the Arctic is a dynamic environment that is undergoing change. How do these changes affect the Arctic itself and the rest of the world?

Entering the competition

The competition has four categories.

- Key Stage 2 (pupils aged 9-11)
- Key Stage 3 (pupils aged 11-14)
- Key Stage 4 or GCSE (pupils aged 14-16)
- Key Stage 5 or A Level (pupils aged 16-18)

The deadline for all entries is **5.00pm Wednesday 10 October 2018.** All winners will be contacted after this date and invited to an Award Ceremony at the Royal Geographical Society (with IBG) in South Kensington, London.

Students should enter the Key Stage category which they will be in as of 10 October 2018.

All entries should include an Entry Form. Submissions can be made by individual students or teachers. Teacher and school contact details must be provided. Please post your entries directly to the Society. **Electronic entries may only be submitted for the KSS category.**

General entry criteria

KS2, KS3 and KS4 students will produce an **A3 poster**. KS5 students will produce a **1,500 word essay**. All entries must clearly illustrate **what makes the Arctic unique** and adhere to the following criteria:

- Excellent attention to spelling, punctuation and grammar
- · Use of accurate geographical terminology throughout
- Clearly labelled and appropriately acknowledged sources, including diagrams, charts, maps, or images
- · Accurate use of symbols, scales and keys, where appropriate
- Original and independently produced—class sets of identical entries will not be accepted
- If produced electronically, please use a minimum font size of point 8

Key Stage 2 criteria

- Describe one or more way(s) in which the Arctic is unique
- Use at least two annotated diagrams, charts, maps or images

Key Stage 3 criteria

- Describe two or more ways in which the Arctic is unique
- Explore both the human and physical geography of the Arctic
- Use at least three annotated diagrams, charts, maps or images

Key Stage 4 criteria

- . Describe three or more ways in which the Arctic is unique
- Explore both the human and physical geography of the Arctic
- Discuss how the Arctic is changing and how these changes affect the Arctic itself and the rest of the world
- Use at least four annotated diagrams, charts, maps or images

Key Stage 5 criteria

- Describe and discuss the wide variety of reasons why the Arctic is unique
- Explore both the human and physical geography of the Arctic, including its environmental, political, social, cultural, and economic distinctiveness
- Discuss how the Arctic is changing and how these changes affect the Arctic itself and the rest of the world
- Explore the past, present, and future governance of the Arctic
- Demonstrate a strong use of annotated diagrams, charts, maps or images











2018-19 PREFECT SELECTION

On Friday 18th May, Ms Creighton and Mr Lomas were delighted to inform eighty Year 10 pupils that, having met rigorous selection criteria, they had been successful in their applications to be a prefect next year. Over half the year group (a very impressive proportion) applied for the position and the successful applicants had to gain the approval of staff to be appointed.

Here, pupils Ella Williams (10L) and Sam Wright (10E) describe the process: 'The prefect application process is simple, but requires thoughtful answers. You have to fill in an application form and answer questions such as 'Why do you think the role of prefect is important?' and 'What qualities do you think would make you an effective prefect?' However, you need a reference from your tutor and another member of staff, so you have to be honest on the form! I applied to be a prefect because it will give me good experience to set me up to go into the workplace. It's a good thing to have on your CV and shows that you are trustworthy. It's important as it develops skills such as teamwork and leadership. It's also important for the Senior Prefect Team to consider ideas from all year groups through the Student Council...to improve Springfield for future year groups.'

The standard of the applications this year was outstanding, illustrating the depth of talent, ambition and dedication to the school from the Year 10 group. Responses from Year 10 pupils include:

If your teachers were asked to describe you, what do you think they would say?

'I hope they would say that I am dedicated, optimistic, creative and confident. I really enjoy learning, so I always try my best in and out of lessons.'

Why do you want to be considered for this role?

'I believe I would be an asset to the Springfield community and to the prefect team. I am very determined to achieve the highest I can. I believe that being a prefect would be a privilege.'

Why do you think being a prefect is important?

'Senior school is a strange place for Year 7s, so it is important that people are there to help ensure a smooth transition. Sometimes concerns about the pupils are best highlighted and solved by other pupils.'

What qualities do you have that you think would make you an effective prefect?

'My punctuality is high, as is my work ethic, which I demonstrate through my Duke of Edinburgh's Award as it requires resilience and the ability to work well under pressure.'

What experience do you have – either in school or in activities outside of school?

'In school I am the tutor group's Sports Captain and have been selected to be a Sports Ambassador for the school. I have given tours to prospective parents, assisted Year 7s as a Reading Ambassador and in school projects. Out of school, I am a patrol leader for Guides and have run and organised activities, talks and events. All of these roles have really pushed and enabled me to enhance my leadership and confidence further.'

The next stage for some of these prefects is to undergo the selection process for the new Senior Prefect team; success will depend upon convincing the current Senior Prefects, Ms Spivey and Ms Creighton of their merits and suitability for these important roles. Watch this space!

YEAR 10 MOCKS

With the Year 11 in the midst of their examination period, Year 10 now come to the forefront of planning for next year. Year 10 pupils have never sat formal examinations in the Sports Hall and gym so are unaware of the protocols and formalities associated with public examinations. Additionally, the terminal examination period is so tightly packed that it is important that Year 10 pupils experience what it's like to be in timed conditions with potentially two, even three, examinations in one day.

Consequently, we have set aside a two week period from June 18th through to Friday 29th June for a series of mocks in various subjects. These will be held in the Sports Hall and pupils should treat them seriously. I know that the Maths department have already put their revision topics on the school's website to help prepare pupils for their three Maths exams, for example.

The mock weeks are also on the website and in tutor bases and I have already spoken to the year group in assembly about the rationale behind the Year 10 mocks. We want pupils to become acclimatised to the demands of the examinations so that next year the exam period can be approached without trepidation.

For reference, there will also be a Mock period in Year 11 around November/December time for the same reason and, in all likelihood, core subject mocks around early March.

CALLING ALL PUPILS AND PARENTS: LET'S IMPROVE ATTENDANCE TOGETHER!

Our overall school attendance remains good and we have seen further recent improvements. However, we always want to get better and would like all pupils to look really closely at their own attendance percentage and ask themselves – could it be better? If you are on 100%, fantastic! Well done and try to maintain it until the end of the year. If not, try to move it closer to 100% by the end of the year. If you are below 95% you should be looking to get back above. If you are under 90% you are classified as 'persistently absent' and you have missed at least

one day per fortnight (at least a day per week if you are less than 80%). You must now do everything you can to attend every day until the end of the year and watch your percentage go up! Talk with your tutors about monitoring your percentage and remember that improvements will be rewarded with house points! You will also feel happier and make better progress at school!

CHAIR OF GOVERNORS

'So, you are a School Governor. What's does that involve? Why do you do that then?'

I think these two questions are the most common ones asked by friends, relatives, associates, neighbours etc., when they learn that you are a school governor, not just at Springfield but at any school.

Once they realise that you are performing a really important and varied voluntary role, committed to and accountable for improving local children's education, the enquirer usually takes a deep breath and congratulates you on doing something that not many people know enough about, but also for finding the time to make a difference. This is what all governors are trying to do, not least those here at Springfield. They make a difference by providing high quality, knowledgeable governance. They ensure that the governing body represents the community it serves.

There are three key functions of the Local Governing Body (LGB) which are: setting the strategic direction of the school; holding school leaders to account and ensuring financial probity. Springfield is part of The De Curci Trust and so local governors work in liaison with the Trustees who delegate specific responsibilities and tasks to the school's Local Governing Body. All Trustees and local governors must follow the Seven principles of Public Life, referred to as 'the Nolan Principles'. Effective governance means having a team of dedicated people who possess a broad range of skills, knowledge and professional experience, who are able to work together in a way that reflects the vision and ethos of the school. Some are parent governors, some have been co-opted, others have seen their children or relations go through the school. All bring individual flair and special ingredients to our work.

Springfield School exists to provide the best possible educational opportunity for the young people who come through the gates. This is achieved by attracting and retaining excellent teaching and non-teaching staff; constantly improving already great facilities; encouraging eager and focussed pupils to achieve their potential along with a highly ambitious executive management team working alongside the governing body to shape and steer the way ahead.

As Chair of Governors, I am incredibly proud to work with a team that is committed to maintaining high standards of educational progress and attainment.

The BIG question is......do you want to come and join us?

The Local Governing Body currently has two vacancies and so the opportunity is there for you to join the team already giving of their time, voluntarily, to help make Springfield School the best it can be. Governors meet at least twelve times a year (usually meetings start in the late afternoon) and there is a need for the reading and review of associated information and documents.

We are looking for people with a broad mix of skills, experience and knowledge and would particularly welcome interest from anyone with legal, financial and/or building expertise to complement our existing expertise. Induction and ongoing training is provided. All local governors are required to undertake an enhanced Disclosure and Barring check in addition to other safeguarding and pre-appointment checks to ensure that they are suitable to work in a children focused environment.

SMART UNIFORM MATTERS



Unfortunately, a small minority find it more difficult to adhere to our straightforward uniform expectations and I would like to draw parents' and pupils' attention some areas of particular concern (full uniform guidelines are available on our website):

- skirts must be plain black and knee length

- trousers must be <u>'regular fit'</u> and not 'skinny'
- <u>no nail varnish</u>, false nails or false eyelashes

Form tutors and year office teams will be doing daily checks and any student who does not comply with our expectations will be requested to make an immediate correction. Failure to do so will lead to home contact, loss of lunchtime (lunch IU) and could lead to internal isolation (repeated refusal will be considered as defiance). Types of homework	Purpose	How to help
Vocabulary/phase and grammar structure learning	To build-up long term memoryexpanding the memory muscle!	Break lists into smaller units. Start with those your child considers "easy". Use the "look, cover, say, write, check" method which they will already be familiar with. Leave for a while and check again to see how much is remembered. If ready- use the same method to learn a few more. If not- go back over the first batch again. It is better to learn some properly than all of them poorly. You may like to see then whether your child can use this information to create sentences
Preparing for/ recording speaking assignments	To allow opportunities for collaborative work outside the classroom and increase spoken confidence	Listen to rehearsals. Provide a quiet place for recording. Listen to a model response and help your child improve his/her own pronunciation and intonation where possible. Saying what they need to aloud to you- even if you don't understand it- will help fix it in your child's mind
Learning role plays off by heart	To improve pronunciation and fluency and develop understanding of the function of different parts of the sentence	Listen to practices. If possible, take the "other" role. Help with individual words. The benefits are the same as above
Reading comprehensions	To build knowledge of a topic and the use of bilingual dictionaries and translation sites	Encourage the use of a bilingual dictionary- either a physical copy or an on-line version. Help him/her find meanings and the strategic use of these resources!
Writing up work as a final piece	To practise drafting and checking before completion	Encourage your child to check work using all the resourcesbrain, book, buddy and of course dictionaries! Encourage good presentation so that they can make sense of their own work later
Writing assignments	To allow pupils to draw from a range of sources to compose ideas in writing	Remind your child to check in any previous exercise books to find other relevant phrases etc. Encourage good presentation and remind them that wholesale translation from online sites teaches them nothing and is pretty easy to spot!
Gathering resources/ data	To prepare for future work in the classroom/flipped learning	Help with collating and organising information once gathered. This helps pupils take charge of their own learning to build independence and their own study-skills
Research	To enable greater independence for pupils through individual contributions and responses	Establish the criteria with your child, the length if time to spend on the work and the quantity needed. Help with skimming and scanning techniques and with summarising the key points so that your child can put them into his/her own words

MFL homework is about supporting and extending the work of the classroom - whether that be through preparations for up-coming work, development of the work underway or a summative piece. Fundamentally as teachers of MFL we want pupils to acquire greater knowledge, skills and understanding of the language they are studying, however these study techniques will have benefits for all their learning - not just for MFL! So please, do feel free to show your support for and interest in the work your child is doing.....bonne chance!


THE FURTHER SUCCESS OF SPRINGFIELD'S PUPILS

We were very pleased to review Springfield's recently published 'Activity Survey'. Produced by Portsmouth Local Authority's Post-16 Data Team, this document summarises what activities our Year 11 (2017) pupils opted to do after leaving Springfield.

The information indicated the ambition, very strong performance and high aspirations of Springfield's pupils. For example:

- Over 90% of Springfield's Year 11 leavers went on to a Sixth Form or FE College (other activities include employment, training and apprenticeships)
- 56% of Springfield's Year 11 leavers at Sixth Form or FE College are studying A-Levels; this is 10% higher than all Portsmouth Local Authority leavers (46%)
- 98% of Springfield's female leavers are now at a participating destination; almost 6% higher than all Portsmouth Local Authority female leavers (92.3%)
- 100% of Springfield's pupils with SEN/D (special educational needs/disability) went on to a participating destination
- The %RPA* for Springfield was 96.5%, higher than the local authority value of 95.7%

*Under the Raising the Participation Age (RPA) legislation, young people are under a duty to participate in education or training until the end of the academic year in which they turn 18.



Well done Springfield's pupils! We hope that our leavers enjoy their post-16 courses/training and wish them every success for the future.






THE GREAT BRITISH SCHOOL SPRINT
